**3.11 (a) REPEAT
CLEANING, SANITIZATION, HOUSEKEEPING, AND PEST CONTROL.**

(a) Cleaning of primary enclosures. Excreta and food waste must be removed from primary enclosures daily, and from under primary enclosures as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and food waste, to prevent soiling of the dogs or cats contained in the primary enclosures, and to reduce disease hazards, insects, pests and odors. The pans under primary enclosures with grill-type floors and the ground areas under raised runs with mesh or slatted floors must be cleaned as often as necessary to prevent accumulation of feces and food waste and to reduce disease hazards pests, insects and odors

Underneath all of the wire-mesh enclosures on the South side (both upper and lower tiers) of the Sundowner building West and North of the house, there was a severe accumulation of fecal material, as high as three to four inches in areas. In addition, in the outdoor portion of the upper enclosure at the Southeastern corner of the building---one housing two adult Chihuahuas---there was a several days' worth of fecal material, some of which had become dried out and partially whitened, accumulated on top of the wire mesh floor as well. Dogs were not being housed on the renovated North side of the Sundowner as of yet. All fecal material must be removed from inside enclosures daily and from underneath enclosures as often as necessary to control odors, pests, and disease risks. This affects 31 adult dogs.

REPEAT NCI

(a) Structure; construction. Housing facilities for dogs and cats must be designed and constructed so that they are structurally sound. They must be kept in good repair, and they must protect the animals from injury, contain the animals securely, and restrict other animals from entering.

There continues to be several areas of disconnected and unraveled wire flooring and wire mesh partitions on the north side of the Sundowner-type building. The affected areas were located on the top and bottom rows and housed approximately nine dogs during the time of inspection. The sharp and unraveled wires are a physical hazard to the dogs as they could potentially injure themselves. Assure that the housing facilities are kept in good repair to protect the animals from injury.

(a) Cleaning of primary enclosures. Excreta and food waste must be removed from primary enclosures daily, and from under primary enclosures as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and food waste, to prevent soiling of the dogs or cats contained in the primary enclosures, and to reduce disease hazards, insects, pests and odors... The pans under primary enclosures with grill-type floors and the ground areas under raised runs with mesh or slatted floors must be cleaned as often as necessary to prevent accumulation of feces and food waste and to reduce disease hazards pests, insects and odors.

1. Mounds of feces were present beneath all of the outdoor enclosures of the Sundowner-type building (housing 35 adult dogs) during the time of inspection. These areas have not been cleaned as necessary/prescribed. The mounds of feces beneath these enclosures measure at least five inches in height. These conditions increase disease hazards produce odors. Thoroughly clean and sanitize these areas and repeat as necessary to promote animal health.

These conditions increase disease hazards, attract pests, and produce odors. Thoroughly clean and sanitize these areas and repeat as necessary to promote animal health.

Structure; construction. Housing facilities for dogs and cats must be designed and constructed so that they are structurally sound. They must be kept in good repair, and they must protect the animals from injury, contain the animals securely, and restrict other animals from entering.

There continues to be several areas of disconnect and unraveled wire flooring and wire mesh partitions on the outdoor runs of the Sundowner-Type building. The affected enclosures were located on the bottom row on the north side of the building and housed approximately 12 dogs. The sharp wires are a physical hazard to the dogs as they could potentially injure themselves. Assure that the housing facilities are kept in good repair to protect the animals from injury.

1. Moderate amounts of feces were present beneath all of the outdoor enclosures of the Sundowner-type building (housing 42 adult dogs) during the time of inspection. These areas have not been cleaned in some time. The feces beneath these enclosures are at least three inches in height. These conditions increase disease hazards, attract

insects and rodents, and produce odors. Thoroughly clean and sanitize these areas and repeat as necessary to promote animal health.

2. Excessive accumulations of feces and urine were also present beneath all of the enclosures in the whelping building (housing 24 adults and 28 puppies) during the time of inspection. Additionally, excessive accumulations of feces were present on the wire floor, inside of the enclosure housing an adult Cairn Terrier, her 4 puppies, an adult Chihuahua and her 4 puppies. These conditions increase disease hazards, attract insects and rodents, and produce odors. Assure that the feces/excreta are removed from inside of the animal enclosures daily. Thoroughly clean and sanitize these areas and repeat as necessary to promote animal health.

3. Excessive accumulations of feces, urine scale, and staining were present on all of the wash downs located beneath the enclosures inside of the Sundowner-type building (housing 42 adult dogs) during the time of inspection. These conditions increase disease hazards, attract insects and rodents, and produce odors. Thoroughly clean and sanitize these areas and repeat as necessary to promote animal health.
